
Genesis Class Newsletter

Amazing learning in Alpha!



Animals Nutrition and the Skeletal System






Vesper Class Newsletter




English

In English we have focused on the text 'The Papaya That Spoke' we have really enjoyed learning the story and how to retell it using actions. We have created story maps about the text as well as thinking about how the farmer would be feeling when no one believed him. We have worked hard on our own versions of the story and have come up with some really interesting talking foods! have some incredible sentences that go with our foods.

History

In History we have been learning about 'Invasion' and all about the Anglo-Saxons. We have learnt why Anglo-Saxon monasteries were so important to Anglo-Saxon Britain and have learnt about the consequences and causes of the Anglo-Saxon invasion.



Maths

In Maths we have been learning about place value. We have learnt how to partition numbers using part whole models as well how to round numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.

We have just started to learn how to add 4-digit numbers with one exchange and have been using all the knowledge we learnt during place value to help us with this.

Alina Class Newsletter



In Maths, we have been looking into the use of place value where we have been learning about rounding to our nearest 10's,100's and 1,000's, partitioning numbers and trying to add and subtract with exchanging on column method.

We have an exciting new teaching style in English with some strange occurances within the classroom. We were infiltrated by a talking Papaya who was up to no-good. We learned about boxing up and learning a strange story about a talking papaya and adapting it to create our own talking object stories.

Things have been rather 'shocking' in science where we have been playing the role of our very own crazy scientist looking into what different components make a complete circuit which allows electrical current to pass through illuminating our classrooms. Anglo-saxons were known as the Angles, Saxons and the Jutes and were pioneers of the re-establishment of Christianity in Britain through the impact of monasteries. We also established the threat that Britain was under at this time following the loss of Roman protection.

As you can see we have been quite busy and can't wait to share what we get up to next half-term as we approach Christmas.

In History, we have carried out research and discussions about the Shang Dynasty. Children have used a range of sources to find out more about artefacts including oracle bones, religion and everyday life.




Lunar Class Newsletter




Maths


We began the year by focusing on place value of numbers and ensuring we are secure with reading and writing larger numbers. We have recapped the four operations and their methods and tackled the dreaded long multiplication and division. Children need to ensure they are secure on all their times table facts and keep practicing these methods regularly to build their speed. We will ensure we keep revising our 4 operations and the methods regularly during the year to develop the children's speed and accuracy, which is all part of their arithmetic and fluency skills.

Across the other subjects we have been just as busy! In Science we have been looking at the human body and the circulatory system. We created a blood smoothie to help us learn about the parts of our blood; we created diagrams of the heart, showing the 4 chambers and created our own life size model of the circulatory system out on the playground.

In History we have been learning about Maafa – the slave trade and the causes and consequences this caused globally. The children are able to explain the route the traders took and what effects there still are today because of it. Computing lessons have focused on using logical reasoning to solve problems, with the children using their skills to predict and modify coding programs. In Art they have looked at tints and tones and using their colour skills to create their own landscapes. They have all thought about how they can improve their sketching and I look forward to seeing their landscapes fully dried and finished.







Aquarium Class - Autumn 1

What a wonderful start to Year 6 we have had! The children have blown us away with their enthusiasm and determination as they begin their final year at Wenlock CE Academy. Here is some of the wonderful learning we have completed so far.

English

In English, we have begun our writing unit on **Zelda Claw and the Rain Cat** with a buzz. We first met Zelda when missing posters appeared around our school. Together, we heard an engaging story about Zelda Claw and turned this into a story map (complete with our very own actions!) and then used this as a base to model and write our own stories.



Maths

We are flying through our Maths curriculum, revising our previous knowledge and learning around place value, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. We have just begun our new topic on fractions and look forward to building on our knowledge around this area.

RE

Our focus this half term in RE has been around the Hindu faith and exploring how Hinduism helps a person to live their life. We have looked at reincarnation, as well as inspirational people within the Hindu faith such as Gandhi.

Science

Our Science topic this half term has focused on the human body. We have become experts in describing what blood is made from, how blood moves around the body, what is good and bad for our bodies and how our bodies are able to break down and use the nutrients.

History

Our new History topic this term has seen us begin to explore the Maafa (which means "great disaster" or "great tragedy". We have been learning lots of new vocabulary, exploring links with past civilisations and finding out about Britain's involvement in the slave trade and the transportation of enslaved people. We are excited to continue our learning on this next half term!

We are so proud of our class and how well the children of Aquarium class have risen to the challenge of Year 6. We look forward to continuing our learning journey with you all after the half term break.

Lighthouse

This term the Lighthouse have been using a themed approach to their nurture sessions in the afternoon. This term we have explored 'Getting to know you' 'Family', 'Happiness', 'Kindness' and 'Anger'. We have used these themes to carry out Art, Cooking, Circle time and Social Skill sessions.
